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## FROM THE DESK OF THE PRESIDENT

**O**akwood Manor Busted --- Now that would be an embarrassing headline to read in the morning paper. And it almost happened! We have been breaking the law every time beer and wine is served at a community function, because the "Selling of Alcoholic Beverages Without a License" is against the law. Oakwood Manor has been doing this for decades. I recently learned that this practice violates Florida law, when I was called by a State special agent. He advised that an anonymous resident of our community made a formal complaint. She submitted dates of Oakwood Manor functions where alcohol was served along with names of those in charge. The agent explained that, if he came to one of our functions and witnessed the act, he would be required to arrest those responsible for the event and charge them with a crime.

As an ex-law enforcement officer, I believe in abiding by the law. So, it was a surprise to me, and I am sure to the rest of you, to learn we have been breaking the law. At the same time, I bet the special agent is over-worked and would prefer to spend his time on serious offenders, rather than worry about what goes on in our community. Frankly, I appreciated the special agent giving us a call and the chance to fix this, instead of coming to Oakwood Manor and making an arrest (at my age I do not care to start a rap sheet). We should also

be grateful for going so long "flying under the radar," before we learned the awful truth --- the state considers us to be small-time hoodlums!

What motivates a resident to go to authorities making a formal complaint against their own community and neighbors?

1) Was there a strong desire for compliance with the law? I doubt this was the motive. Bringing Oakwood Manor into compliance with the law could have easily been accomplished by leaving me or the office a signed or unsigned suggestion.

2) Was she angry with the HOA and had a desire for revenge over some perceived slight? The anonymous complaint could easily have resulted in some of our hard working volunteers being arrested and fined (or worse). I wonder if the complainer considered that she would have to help pay those fines and legal fees through her monthly assessment? A huge amount of extra work and aggravation has been caused for me personally and many of the Social Committee volunteers, while we try to figure out the best way to proceed.

3) Or did she want to impose her own moral values regarding alcohol upon the entire community? With the Temperance Movement and Prohibition of the early twentieth century, history has proven these efforts to be fruitless. Alcohol will continue to be consumed by residents at specified community functions. If that were her motive, she has failed. The only question is whether Oakwood Manor will apply for a liquor license or simply have a bring your own bottle policy (which is legal).

Does it really matter what her motive was? Does it matter who it was? In the end, we are

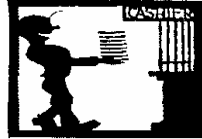

## TREASURER'S REPORT


March 31, 2011

**F**or the month of March we had Operating Income of \$97,847 and Operating Expenses of \$101,199 resulting in an Operating Loss for the month of \$3,352. Year to date we have had Operating Income of \$261,965 and Operating Expenses of \$256,115 resulting in an Operating Profit year to date of \$5,850. Our loss for the month of March was attributed to an extra pay period totaling \$12,419, paying for year end accounting and audit \$10,500, and resurfacing the shuffleboard courts \$4,407. We were lucky to have a good month in Real Estate income totaling \$13,718 or our loss would have been greater.

Our month end Cash balances were Operating \$63,605 and replacement Funds \$648,164. Our Notes Receivable from owners was \$32,850 and our Notes Payable RBC Bank was \$435,473.

Additions to Fixed Assets for the month was \$2,517 for the start of the Kitchen Project.

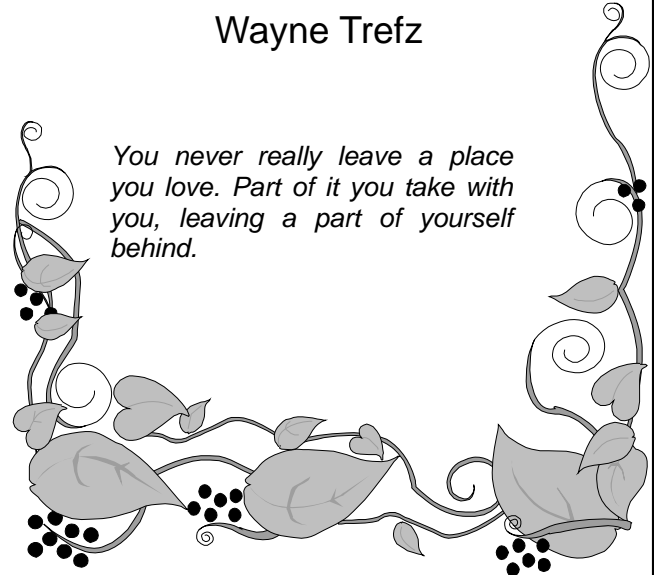
left to deal with the consequences. Residents, who perceive a "wrong," should address the issue more directly and closer to home. Going to the state first is like going after an ant with a sledge hammer. You may get the ant, but your kitchen counter will never be the same.

If you have a complaint with your neighbor, try to work it out directly with that neighbor before complaining to an outside authority. And, if you have any issues with your HOA, go directly to the park manager or board, anonymously if you wish. Going to the state to complain about your HOA should only be done as a last resort. After all, you are the HOA.

## OAKWOOD MANOR HOMEOWNERS ASSOCIATION MINUTES BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S MEETING—April 19, 2011

**T**he board meeting was called to order at 7:00 by President John Lavezzo. He asked for a moment of silence to reflect on any concerns.

Roll was called with all nine (9) members being present.

Secretary Report – John Lavezzo moved to waive the reading of the March minutes, with a second by Maryann Noonan. No corrections were noted, the minutes were approved.

Treasurer Report - Frank Dawes reported that for the month of March we had Operating Income of \$97, 847 and Operating Expenses of \$101,199 resulting in an operating loss of \$3,352. Full report attached to the official minutes and will also be published in the May edition of the Acorn.

### OFFICER REPORTS:

President - John Lavezzo thanked all for the good turnout at the meeting and that our next meeting will be October 18, 2011.

Vice President – Kathy Bondi reported that the new channel is the National Geographic Wild Animals on channel 87.

Treasurer – Frank Dawes reported that a letter was received from the auditor stating that we had a satisfactory audit rating.

Assistant Treasurer - Howard Orth commented on Kim Johnson who is the new bookkeeper and the great job she is doing. He also commented that expenses are running very close to budget and that we are in very good shape.

Secretary – Charlotte Akers thanked all of the volunteers for their hard work and wished all that are leaving for the summer to have a safe trip.

Assistant Secretary – Maryann Noonan – On April 1 the new procedures for vehicles coming in and leaving Oakwood Manor was instituted and thanked everyone for their cooperation. She asked all residents to remind their guests to follow rules and regulations and to read the signs posted in the pool area, hot tub and miniature golf course and to abide by them.

Real estate – Norm Wilcox – Announced the names of new residents and welcomed them to our park. He then introduced Skip Mann for the real estate report. Skip reported that total sales closed and pending total \$1,470,300 which is 104% change from 2010 and total commission to HOA is \$29,406 which is 85.62% change from 2010. Complete real estate report attached to the official minutes and will also be published in the May issue of the Acorn.

Social – Lois Charen – There was a social committee meeting on March 13 with chairpersons from the various groups attending. She announced that Dorothy Nace has resigned as head of the library after 21 years and thanked her for her hard work and dedication. Hopefully the park phone book will be available for distribution next week. Pictures for the 2012 pictorial book will start in October with a second session in January.

Grounds and Maintenance – Dick Potts – Announced that we have a new maintenance em-

ployee , Phil Harrison, who is doing an excellent job with the landscaping.

Manager's Report – Dennis Bucher – Invited all residents to meet and greet the two new employees when they see them. He thanked Kathleen Buchan for the beautiful job repainting the mural at the pool. There were no problems with spring break visitors. Mark Postma has been hired to replace three pipes in the park. The park has turned off the water from the canal as of April 1, 2011. Dick Potts requested that the water on Ash Terrace not be turned off permanently as it may be needed for irrigation to the area.

## OLD BUSINESS

Pool guard during spring break – Maryann Noonan reported that we have installed three new security cameras around the pool area and that there have been no major incidents during spring break. Lois requested that we should still budget for a security guard at the pool next year in case we need it.

Update on kitchen remodeling – Lynn Kirchhoff updated the progress of getting bids from the contractors. She is awaiting the bids from two companies. She requested that Frank set up a separate account for social committees to transfer the funds they wish to contribute to the kitchen. Lynn recognized Art Schulte for his hours of work taking down the library shelves. Lou Colombo was concerned of who would be overseeing the job during the summer when most board members are away. John assured him that he will follow the progress of the work and have final approval of all checks.

Ash Terrace Fence – Dick Potts went over the many options varying from fencing to shrub planting in that area. Dick made a motion to allocate up to \$3,000 for Dennis to plant shrubs along Ash Terrace seconded by John. The motion passed unanimously.


Review of Rule #56 regarding sprinklers and irrigation – Lois expressed her concerns with the lawn service having problems mowing the lawns if hoses or sprinklers are left in the way. Dick Potts stated that each resident needs to be responsible for their hoses and sprinklers. Dick Potts made motion to eliminate rule #56 from the Rules and Regulations with second from Kathy Bondi. The motion passed.

Clubhouse roof and heating and cooling vents - Tri-County Air Conditioning found leaks around ducts and vents with estimate of repairs costing \$1000. To replace air conditioner, there would be a cost of \$12,000. John made a motion to approve \$1,000 for repair of the leaking ducts and vents with a second made by Frank Dawes. The motion passed.

Quilter cabinet request – Sharon Rump requested to spend \$185.00 from the kitchen fund for a cabinet for quilting supplies. John denied the request until receiving further information.

Alcohol at social functions – John explained the different types of licenses that could be acquired in order to legally supply alcohol at our social functions. Dick Potts discussed the cost of the license is \$392 per year for serving beer and wine. Dick made a motion that we pursue getting the license with a second by Lois. After discussion, Frank Dawes objected to the Board paying for the license and suggested that the social committee pay for it.. The motion was amended to allow the social committee to pursue getting the beer and wine license at their expense with a second by Lois. With no further discussion, the motion passed.

RV and trailer parking petition – John requested that any residents from 109 to 121 White Oak Way please step forward to discuss this issue. As none came forward, the issue was dismissed.

Motion to adjourn the meeting made by Howard Orth with a second by Frank Dawes. The meeting adjourned at 8:50 p.m.

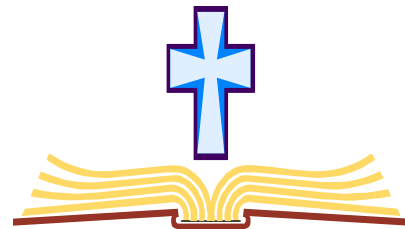

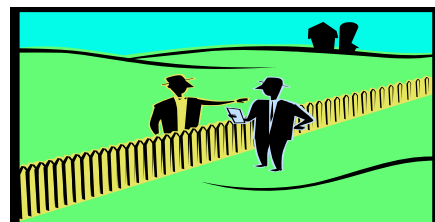

#### FRESH APPLE CAKE

*Courtesy of A Lowcountry Backyard (A Taste of Hilton Head Magazine)*

#### **Ingredients:**

**3 Cups Flour**

**2 Cups Sugar**

**2 Teaspoons Cinnamon**

**2 Teaspoons Baking Soda**

**1 Teaspoon Salt**

**4 Cups Peeled and Cubed Granny Smith Apples**

**4 Tablespoons Lemon Juice**

**2 Eggs**

**1 Cup Vegetable Oil**

**Preparation:** *Sprinkle prepared apples with lemon juice. Let apples stand while mixing dry ingredients. Stir in eggs and oil to dry mix to form a smooth batter. Fold apples into batter. Bake in bundt pan or 13x9 inch pan for about 1 hour at 350 degrees or until you can insert a toothpick and remove it clean.*

**Topping:** *Mix 1/2 cup melted butter and 1/2 cup brown sugar. Spread on warm cake. Sprinkle with chopped walnuts, pecans (which I used) or your favorite chopped nuts.*

**Comments:** *1. When mixing the dry and liquid ingredients together, I didn't get a smooth batter - it was moist but formed a crumbly mix (it almost got thrown out and something from Publix in its place). Tossed in the apples and continued with the recipe. 2. To cut down the sweetness, you could cut the topping in half.*

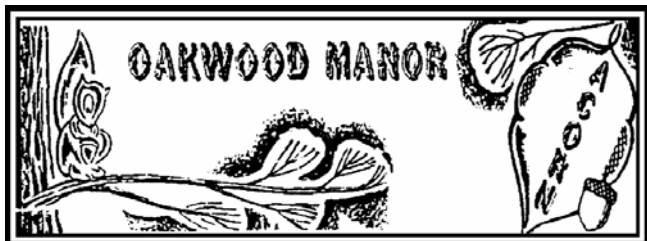
The Board would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the volunteers who helped make it such a success. Without our wonderful volunteers Oakwood Manor would not be what it is today.
